SCHOOL THREAT

School Threat In Both Allen And Warren County

Just three days after a shooting threat in both Allen and Warren Counties, Glasgow Police Department received an alert of a threat to Glasgow Independent Schools. The alarming information obtained on Saturday evening, December 10 was immediately investigated by Detective Andrew Moore and Sgt. Aaron Cowan. The threat was discovered on the social media platform SnapChat, which is popular among youth under the age of 16. The message stated: "...shoot up students at school or at a ballgame and I hate Glasgow Schools."

Glasgow detectives were assisted by both the Kentucky State Police and the FBI to locate the suspect who posted the shooting threat. The investigation resulted in a juvenile arrested and charged with "Terroristic Threatening second degree." Public Information Officer Major Terry Platt could not confirm the identity of the person arrested due to age. However he did state, "No specific school or individual was named in the threat and no immediate danger."

After reaching out to Glasgow Independent School Superintendent Chad Mulhenkamp, he replied with the following statement:

Upon arrival, the home was totally engulfed in flames and the department was on the scene for four hours. The Emmitt's son Phillip stated he tried to exit the home with his mother, yet she was unable to make it to the door way due to thick smoke. Both Jerry and Ida Emmitt perished along with Luna the Aussie dog. Daughter Melissa and Phillip were able to get out. Anderson's Market, 6513 Mt Union Road is receiving funds for funeral expenses for the family and a Gofundme account is created by a close family friend Jason Carter.
